Questions addressed include:

Who are the Political parties? What is the significance of referenda in the political life of the UK? What is the influence of the media in UK Politics?

B) The Political institutions in the UK and how each works. The respective roles of the PM and Cabinet, Parliament and the Judiciary as well as the definition and place of the Constitution.

Questions addressed include:

Has the reform of the Constitution gone far enough? Who has power within the existing Constitution? Why do Judges decisions appear increasingly political? Who makes the Law?

What are the core ideas and principles of these political ideas? How do they explain the relationship of human nature and the state and society? What is the role of the economy in Politics?
