



Assessment

The A-level Examination

At the end of you're A-level course you will have three examinations:

Paper 1: 2 hours 30 minutes50% of A-levelListening, reading and translation into Spanish and English

Paper 2: 2 hour20% of A-levelTranslation into Spanish and response to a question on a set text or a set film

Paper 3:30% of A-levelOral examination: 21 to 23 minutes (including 5 minute preparation)

To make the transition, we would like you to:

Compulsory tasks

- Write a diary of <u>3 days</u> of your summer holiday, describing what you did during the day (activities/how you felt ...), using the past tense and a variety of tenses if possible. You need to write approx. 100 words for each day. <u>Bring your work in the first lesson in September</u>; your teacher will collect it.
- 2. Revise your grammar (tenses, adjectives etc.) using the languages online website. You should have a clear understanding of the verb system. Review any GCSE grammar point if you are uncertain.


or look at Spanish magazines/newspapers (El mundo).

- 2. If you have satellite TV, try and watch **TVE or noticias 24 horas** or access it through the internet: www.biophobia.es
- 3. Keep a look out for news items in the British press about Spain or other Spanish speaking countries and perhaps start a cuttings collection (very useful additional material for your speaking exam).
- 4. Try to watch some Spanish films, e.g. : "Volver", "la lengua de las mariposas", "mar adentro"
- 5. If you go to Spain, speak as much Spanish as you can.


