On 6 February we again celebrated Founder's Day with an inspiring talk from Kate Philp who came to speak to us about her expedition to the South Pole



This was followed by a Chapel service which gave thanks for our founder Miss Eleanor Wyatt. ## Homeless Shelter Volunteering



The highlight of the trip was Gaudi's magnum opus, the spectacular, unfinished Sagrada Familia where the girls admired the wonders of the nativity façade, the modern interior and the clever passion façade. After they were rewarded with pizza, Heathfield girls took a stroll in the beautiful gardens of Parc Guell, seeing the famous lizard sculpture and the colourful, chaotic style of Gaudi. On our final day, we made our way up to the top of the mountains to Montserrat, taking a ride up to the peak in a funicular before visiting the monastery and rubbing the globe of the mysterious and ancient Black Madonna. At last it was time for us
