We started the Michaelmas Term on a high as our outgoing UVI Form secured impressive university places which included Exeter, girls achieved an outstanding set of results with more than half of all exams taken awarded the highest A*-A grades (53%). One in five girls achieved at least 6 A* grades each in their GCSEs. A clean sweep of A*-A was achieved in seven subjects including Chemistry and Biology.

During the Summer work started on our

brand new STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) building which is due to be completed during Summer 2015. We experienced a day without power, although Heathfield carried on regardless with science lessons being taught by candle-light and excited about the STEM building and look forward to being able to teach our girls in the facility. 

On Friday 31 October 2014 the Form III girls were woken early for a most memorable day trip to the First World War battlefields around Ypres.

After picking up our wonderful guide Mick at Maidstone Services and having a spot of breakfast we made our way across the Channel to Belgium.

Our first stop was Lijssenthoek, on the outskirts of Ypres, where the students were introduced to a huge British military cemetery. We learnt about the gravestones as well as some of the individuals who were laid to rest there. There were many different nationalities of soldiers buried there alongside the British including Australians, Americans, French, Canadians, Indians, Chinese and even Germans. There was also a female nurse called Nellie Spindler who, we learned, had been hit by a shell whilst trying to save wounded soldiers. It was alarming to see that the vast majority of those buried there were aged between 19 and 24 years of age.

Our next stop was another cemetery which was notable for two things. Firstly, it was where the doctor John Macrae is said to have written the poem *In Flanders Fields* and secondly, it has the grave of a 15 year old boy called Valentine Strudwick, one of the youngest to die on the Western Front in World War One. Here we stopped for a wonderful picnic lunch by the canal which we were able to enjoy because of the beautiful, unseasonal weather and the fruits of our excellent catering staff's labour.

Once we were fed we took our first trip into the town of Ypres, a beautiful town dominated by the medieval-looking Cloth Hall. We learnt that this had been completely rebuilt after the war because the whole town had been destroyed by fighting. This was the location of the In Flanders Fields Museum, a very modern, artistic and interactive museum that certainly does not hide away from the horrors of the war. Girls were given 'poppy bracelets' which enabled them to learn about real case studies from the war.

Then it was off to the preserved German trenches at Bayernwald to experience a bit of trench life. Despite the lovely weather they were still muddy and most unpleasant. Here the girls learnt about the conditions soldiers lived in and the everyday health and hygiene problems they had to deal with, including rats as big as dogs! While the girls enjoyed running through the zig zagged patterns of trenches, they were glad to be able to leave them – something they appreciated was not possible for the soldiers in the First World War.

After a quick hot chocolate stop we were ready to embark on our last two stops of the day: a German cemetery at Langemarck and the largest British cemetery in the world at Tyne Cot. By visiting both belligerents' trenches the girls were able to draw sobering comparisons between the two; the German cemeteries were small, dark and full of mass graves which was a stark contrast to the huge, light, open rows of bright white stones marking the graves of individual Commonwealth soldiers.

The day ended with a meal and a chance for chocolate shopping in Ypres followed by the very moving Last Post Cemetery at the Menin Gate. Three girls (Chloe, Jenny and Nicole) were chosen to lay a wreath during the ceremony because of the interest they had shown during the day.

An inspirational day was had by all and this was reflected in the work books completed by all students, particularly Arielle, Ellie, Lydia, Grace, Harriet and Esme who won prizes for their efforts.

Music Trip to Venice

Early in the morning on Friday 17 October, a sleepy but excited group of girls and staff left Heathfield in rather gloomy, autumnal weather for the warm sunshine of Venice. Arriving before lunch allowed us time to settle into our hotel, explore the vicinity, enjoy supper together and still get an early night and a good rest before our first full day in this spectacular and unique city. Bustling and vibrant, Venice nevertheless feels calmer than other conurbations, on account of the absence of road traffic; rush hour on the *vaporetto*, although somewhat uncomfortable, was still preferable to the London Underground!

On Saturday morning, a visit to the Museo della Musica gave us an opportunity to see a range of ancient and more modern musical instruments and to learn about the famous Baroque composer Antonio Vivaldi, born in Venice in 1678. This was followed by a challenge to girls and staff: to make our way, in groups, through the picturesque streets to the church of Santa Maria dei Miracoli. Mrs Dance issued maps and reassured us all that street signs pointed the way to significant landmarks, adding that the tourist guides all agree that the best way to see Venice is to get lost there! In the event, everyone arrived in plenty of time for the scheduled rehearsal, perhaps a minor *miracolo*! The marble church was stunning and offered a wonderful acoustic to the choir. Unfortunately, the organ proved unusable, but the girls were undaunted by a last-minute change to some items in the planned programme and sang beautifully to the accompaniment of a violin. As always, it was encouraging to have the support of a number of loyal parents, as well as Ms Lavender, who by coincidence was in Venice for a short holiday.

I imagine that few tourists in Venice fail to visit St Mark's Basilica, but not many have enjoyed the privilege of singing at Sunday Mass there. Once again, the girls rose to the occasion, singing four unaccompanied items to a large congregation in this awe-inspiring edifice.

After the service, we visited the Doge's

Palace and were able to soak up a little of the history of Venice: as well as being the ducal residence, the palace housed political institutions of the Republic of Venice until the Napoleonic occupation of the city in 1797 and had been linked to the prison since the 16th century by the notorious Bridge of Sighs.

The choir's final performance took place at the English International School in Padua. This was a programme of mostly secular music in the form of vocal and instrumental solos, an *a cappella* group number and full choir items, all of which proved popular with the school's staff and pupils, who clapped along enthusiastically to the upbeat numbers. After three days in Venice, it felt strange to be transported to and around Padua on trains and buses.

In addition to the music (including some spontaneous busking) we had plenty of time to explore Venice, enjoying the scenery, the architecture, the shops and markets and, of course, the *gelati*. However, the greatest treat has to have been the gondola rides which we all enjoyed on our last

morning in the city of canals.

I am sure the girls will all agree that this was a wonderful trip and huge thanks are due to Mrs Dance, who worked tirelessly to ensure its success. Thanks go too to Alison and Miss Liokoura for their support, but most of all to the girls themselves, without whom the tour would not have been possible.
