

# Confirmation

Confirmation candidates with Governor, Dr Jonathan Baker, Bishop of Fulham

On Sunday 19th January as Heathfield was bathed in glorious winter sunshine, fifteen girls and one member of staff were Confirmed into the Anglican Communion at the school's Chapel of the Ascension. Having been prepared for Confirmation by Fr Tim, the candidates processed in with the girls dressed in the traditional white dress of Heathfield and were presented to the Right Reverend Dr Jonathan Baker, Bishop of Fulham and Governor of the school. Before a large congregation made up of the girls' friends and families, the candidates made their promises to follow Christ and renounce evil. The Bishop, Fr Tim and the congregation prayed for them. Following a hymn, beautifully accompanied by Miss Kong and the Heathfield choir, Bishop Jonathan then laid his hand on the head of each candidate, confirmed them by name and anointed them. After all sixteen candidates had been confirmed, the Chapel erupted into a joyful



round of applause. The congregation then received Holy Communion or a blessing from Bishop Jonathan and Fr Tim before the newly confirmed left Chapel each holding a candle to symbolise the light of Christ. The Chapel then emptied and friends, families, girls and staff all mingled to celebrate the event in the Assembly Hall with some canapés and lots of smiles.

This was the 'Animal Heads' piece made by Carmen Ceniga Prado (Heathfield 2011-2013), who has recently been accepted into the prestigious School of the Arts Institute of Chicago. All visitors recognised the outstanding quality and the variety of styles of work. Students clearly made their own journeys in their art and worked with high levels of skills but independent in their thinking.

A number of art industry experts enjoyed the exhibition and all commented on the quality of the girls' artwork, suggesting it looked to be degree standard or professional. There were some real accolades for our students! The exhibition looked absolutely fabulous and guests not only enjoyed art, but they also enjoyed tasty and beautifully crafted canapés prepared by our art scholar's father, Antony Worrall Thompson, as well as delicious cakes prepared by a friend of Mr and Mrs Worrall Thompson.



# Dining Room Makeover

Throughout the Michaelmas Term, Lee Turner, Heathfield's Catering Manager, took part in a course where he spent time in six other private schools' catering departments across the South. During this time Lee saw how these other schools were presenting their food, the choice of food on their menus and how they managed their catering departments. Lee thoroughly enjoyed the experience and brought back plenty of exciting ideas to implement at Heathfield.

On the first day back after half term the Dining Room had been transformed visually, taking on a rustic feel with pots of herbs on the tables, wooden boxes for fruit and cereals and even the milk dispensers looked like cows! The Catering department have presented the food in a whole new light with 'bowl food' on offer at lunch and supper times, porridge and soup now comes in funky mugs from their own serving station, the salads are simpler and more refined, there is a choice of hot and cold puddings and there is still plenty of fruit for everyone. Kilner jars and bottles are all the rage with homemade chutneys, salad dressings, seeds and nuts being served in them. Mini Kilner jars are also used to present delicate puddings including blueberry cheesecake, lemon posset and banoffee pie!

The girls no longer get biscuits at break or cake every day at tea but a range of new snacks has been introduced including homemade muffins, yoghurt coated raisins and frozen grapes. Another benefit of the new food is the nutritional value. The girls are now consuming more fruit and vegetables than ever before with smoothies being served that contain hidden vegetables and vegetables being put into some cake recipes, for example courgette loaf being served at tea. So far the feedback from both girls and staff has been extremely positive. One member of the Catering team said "it is so wonderful to see the girls so enthused and excited about what they will be eating for breakfast each morning". The Catering department was recently inspected and has received the best Food Hygiene rating possible - Rating 5, Very Good.

Huge thanks must go to the Catering team who have all worked extremely hard to make the new dining room experience such a great success.
